In the meantime, UC Davis and other institutions are beginning to figure out how to get the most out of iTunes U. Through the service, the university has offered a variety of free on-campus courses, including "Literature and the Environment" in English and "Developmental Psychology" in psychology.

Even though these courses are popular, students from iTunes U also take Arabic Without Walls English, an iPhone application class, and a design as activism class from the landscape architecture department—all of which are among the iTunes U courses with the most views.

Over the course of the past 18 months, more than 493,000 audio downloads have been made for another popular course taught by the university's history department. The medieval period, architecture, and literature are all covered in this overview of European civilization.

According to Apple's support document for iTunes U, the company intends to end the program at the end of 2021, but teachers will still be able to upload course material until the 2020-21 academic year. In the interim, teachers can turn the iPad into a powerful teaching assistant and monitor student progress by utilizing apps like Classroom and Schoolwork.

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
